Diversifying your income model

This booklet contains information about Grant Funding available in the Nelson Tasman region, however, a robust and sustainable income model could also include the following revenue streams.

- **Membership**
People pay a membership or subscription fee to belong and in return, they receive specific services, benefits, or privileges.
- **Donations**
People donate time, money or other resources expecting nothing in return. Donations can be both large and small.
- **Sponsorship**
Businesses contribute time, money, or other resources and there is an expectation to receive something in return.
- **Fundraising**
Activities are organized for the sole purpose of raising extra funds. These activities usually rely on member, volunteer, or client involvement and do not necessarily relate to the services you offer.
- **Entrepreneurial Activities**
Your organization trades products or services in a traditional business model. These activities are not necessarily your core business, but they add value to your existing business.
- **Contracts**
A third party (usually a government department) contracts your organization to provide a specific service or program and pays you for doing so.

Community Events Fund

What we fund: Events that contribute community wellbeing benefits, and the Arts and Heritage Activity Management Plan to prioritise funding towards events that contribute to:

- A rich events calendar providing a diverse range of events for people to enjoy.
- A sense of identity providing opportunities for community groups to celebrate and share their culture.
- Partnership – Building the capacity and visibility of the community sector and promoting local creativity.
- Community Wellbeing – Promotion of the wellbeing and cohesion of the local community.

2 funding rounds p.a:

- March - for grants paid in May.
 - Opens: 3rd March 2025–Closes: 13th April 2025
- August - for grants paid in November.
 - Opens: 4th August 2025–Closes: 12th September 2025

ARTS/HERITAGE PARTNERSHIP GRANT FUND

What we fund: This fund supports projects led by the community but contributing to delivery of both Councils Arts (He Tātai Whetū) and Heritage (Taonga Tuku Iho) strategies.

\$50,000 of funding split 50/50 on Arts and Heritage is available each Financial Year. That funding is also split on a bicultural basis with 50% of the funding targeted for delivery of Māori activity.

There is no closing date as this fund works on a rolling/on demand basis. Council staff aim to get back to applicants within 10 days of the application submission.

WASTE MINIMISATION GRANTS

Rethink Waste Whakaarohia Waste Minimisation Grants

What: funding to avoid or reduce waste through community-led projects.

The purpose of these grants is to build capacity and leadership in our community to deliver projects which avoid or reduce waste – activities could include design and implementation, education and workshops, purchase of equipment and materials – to give just a few examples.

How much: Grants up to \$10,000 per project (maximum \$40,000 available).

The Tasman District Council offers funding to support community initiatives within the Tasman District. These grants primarily target charitable and voluntary groups involved in arts, waste minimization, youth, environment, events, and recreation.

COMMUNITY GRANTS

These grants aim to empower communities to deliver impactful projects that align with the Council's community outcomes. Open to non-profit groups and organisations.

- **Examples of eligible expenses:** service fees, administration costs related to a specific project, equipment hire or purchase, building improvements, catering.
- **Non-eligible expenses:** salaries, on-going operational costs (e.g. rent, internet, power bills).
- **Open** from 1 May to 31 July.

SPECIAL GRANTS

These grants support new significant events or projects. There are no specific categories for funding however the application must be for at least **\$10,000** and must show other sources of funding. The availability of this grant depends on the growth of the region and is not always available.

TASMAN CREATIVE COMMUNITIES

Supports project that create opportunities for people to engage with and participate in the arts. This grant is for individuals and community groups in Tasman District.

Closing dates: 10 March, 10 July, and 10 November.

SPORT NEW ZEALAND RURAL TRAVEL FUND

Provides assistance with travel costs for junior teams (ages 5–19) participating in local competitions. **Non-eligible expenses:** sport practice, regional or national events, and interschool events during school time.

Closing dates: 30 April and 31 October.

MOTUEKA DISCRETIONARY FUND

Three funds to support community projects, board-related activities, and youth-related activities.

GOLDEN BAY DISCRETIONARY FUND

Funding towards projects, events, and initiatives in the Golden Bay Community Board area. Maximum amount is **\$1000**

WASTE MINIMISATION AT EVENTS

This grant supports the community in reducing waste at events across the Tasman District. The maximum amount is **\$700**, and applications are open year-round.

WASTE MINIMISATION FOR SCHOOLS, ECE, AND COMMUNITY GROUPS

Applicants can request maximum **\$1,000**. This grant is open all year.

WASTE MINIMISATION PROJECTS GRANT

Larger waste minimisation grants available for community groups and businesses.

GRANT GURU

Tasman District Council offers free access to grant search engine Grant Guru. There are more than 1600 grants listed for community groups and businesses.

Tū Manawa Active Aotearoa is an activation fund that supports tamariki and rangatahi, particularly those facing barriers to being active, to access quality play, active recreation, or sport opportunities in their community or school and kura.

Aligned with our mission of "*Empowering the sector to provide high quality and equitable physical activity opportunities*" we are interested in programmes or projects from organisations that provide physical activity opportunities to support tamariki and rangatahi in the community that are known to be less active.

We welcome applications for this fund for sports, active recreation and play projects from eligible organisations.

EXAMPLES OF WHO WE FUND

- Hapū, Iwi, Marae, Māori organisations
- Primary/Intermediate schools/Kura
- Secondary schools/Wharekura
- Tertiary Education/Whare Wānanga
- Charitable Trusts
- Councils
- Incorporated Societies
- For-profit businesses/commercial organisations and social enterprises.

EXAMPLES OF WHAT WE CAN FUND (Please refer webpage for more details)

- Programme or project delivery (e.g. venue or equipment hire, participant transport to your activity)
- Equipment, providing it is needed as part of a project, activation, or programme
- Coaches and officials, where these are required for delivery of the programme
- Staff that will deliver the programme, where they are not already funded from other sources.

EXAMPLES OF WHAT WE DON'T FUND (Please refer webpage for more details)

- Costs that are not directly required for the provision of the activity that you are applying for (such as salaries or wages for existing staff, administrative overheads etc)
- Costs that are already funded by other sources.
- Costs of retrospective projects or activities (those that have already been completed or held)
- Costs associated with professional athletes, professional sports teams, academies, or representative teams.
- Capital costs (e.g., facility development and maintenance, playgrounds)
- Medals, prizes, giveaways, and spot prizes.

NELSON CITY CREATIVE COMMUNITIES LOCAL ARTS FUNDING SCHEME



ABOUT: Arts Council Nelson administers the Nelson City Creative Communities Scheme [CCS] on behalf of Creative New Zealand and Nelson City Council.

Grants contribute toward arts-based projects that clearly demonstrate community benefits within the Nelson City Council wards only. The scheme has \$46,500 to allocate annually over three funding rounds which close in March, July, and November each year.

Creative Communities Scheme funding is available in each region nationally, applicants should apply to the region in which the benefits of their project will be realized.

FUNDING CRITERIA: Projects must meet one or more of these three funding criteria-

- Broad Community Involvement - the project will create opportunities for local communities. to engage with and participate in arts activities.
- Diversity - The project will support the diverse arts and cultural traditions of local communities, enriching and promoting their uniqueness and cultural diversity.
- Young People - The project will enable and encourage young people (under 18) to engage with and actively participate in the arts

WHO WE FUND

Groups organizations and Individuals who are New Zealand citizens or permanent residents can apply for CCS funding.

EXAMPLES OF WHAT WE CAN FUND

- materials for arts activities or programs
- venue or equipment hire.
- personnel & administrative costs for short-term projects
- promotion & publicity of arts activities.

WHAT WE DON'T FUND

- ongoing administration or personnel costs that are not related to the specific project.
- costs for projects already started or completed.
- travel costs to attend performances or exhibitions in other areas.
- buying equipment, such as computers, cameras, musical instruments, costumes, lights, or uniforms
- entry fees for competitions, contests, and exams
- prize money, awards, and judges' fees for competitions > royalties
- the purchase of artworks for collections
- the costs of running fundraising activity
- debt or interest on debt

APPLICATION TIPS

A full guide for applicants is available on the ACN website: <http://www.acn.org.nz/funding.html> along with an overview brochure in 11 languages.

Whilst there is no upper limit that may be applied for, grants for project assistance are generally around \$1,200 - \$1,500 although worthy projects requiring greater assistance will certainly be considered by the Assessment Committee.

Funding decisions are usually confirmed within six weeks from each closing date.

The Ministry for Ethnic Communities is the government's chief advisor on ethnic communities, ethnic diversity, and the inclusion of ethnic communities in wider society. We work with communities, other government agencies, and a range of organizations to help increase social cohesion and ensure Aotearoa New Zealand is a place where everyone feels welcome, valued, and empowered to be themselves. We also provide services and support directly to ethnic communities.

What we fund

The Ethnic Communities Development Fund has \$4.2 million a year available for projects that support ethnic communities. The fund's purpose is to improve social cohesion in Aotearoa New Zealand and support ethnic communities to be included, feel connected, and participate in society.

The priorities of the Fund are:

- Take action to promote the value of diversity and improve the inclusion of ethnic communities.
- Ensure equitable provision of, and access to, Government services for ethnic communities.
- Develop and support initiatives to improve economic outcomes, including addressing barriers to employment.
- Work to connect and empower ethnic community groups.

What we don't fund

- Grants to individuals
- Grants for capital works
- Already completed or partially completed projects.
- Debt repayment or servicing
- Activities intended to generate profit.
- Operational or business-as-usual costs
- Businesses for profit, political goals, or religious ministry
- Projects to raise money.
- Alcohol or similar substances

We provide a platform for donors to invest in our community through many forms of giving including through regular giving (for example payroll) small and large one-off donations and through bequests.

WHAT WE DON'T FUND

Our General Fund prioritises applications and projects that work towards creating thriving and equitable communities including:

- Targeted services for community support
- Family services/support
- Youth projects focused on those who support
- Innovative projects for women and girls

Our Smaller Environment Fund prioritizes projects supporting thriving natural environments.

APPLICATION TIPS

Our maximum grants are \$10,000.

We also encourage local charities to consider applying to The Tindall Foundation, in their 'Family and Environment Focus Areas'. Their donations range from \$500 to \$15,000 and are typically in the \$2-5,000 range.

APPLICATION TIPS

Projects that help TTF reach outcomes and meet more TTF priorities will have a greater chance of receiving support.

ABOUT

Network Tasman Charitable Trust has been established to:

- Allocate approximately \$200,000 annually to individuals, groups, and organisations within its distribution area by way of grants and scholarships.
- The grants allocation is to acknowledge contributions to the growth of the Company (Network Tasman Ltd) from those past and present users of our lines business but who do not receive or have not received annual discounts and dividends on the days they are made.
- Fund the Sir Wallace Rowling Scholarships for secondary students each year attending tertiary studies.

WHAT WE DON'T FUND

- No applicant can expect an ongoing grant. As a general rule the Trust will not provide funding for more than three consecutive years to any one organisation.
- Grants will not be made for projects which have budgeted a deficit. Expected income or funding sources that are claimed for in the application must be reasonable and likely to be achieved.
- Grants may not be used to fund debt repayment.
- Grants will not be provided to private businesses, government agencies or political parties.
- We do not retrospectively fund projects.
- Purchase or improvement of privately owned facilities.
- Activities that involve any tobacco, illegal substances, and gaming.
- Activities or initiatives where the primary purpose is to promote religious belief or political activities.

WHAT WE CAN FUND

Funding generally falls into five main categories:

- Social support services
- Sport and recreation
- Education
- Art and Culture
- Environmental and Energy-saving

Generally, grants will not be available for wages or operating costs, however, consideration will be given to funding the cost of providing specialist services, training, and professional development.

GENERAL GUIDELINES

- Applicants must be end-users of Network Tasman Limited line facilities as recorded in the records of the Company. In the event of the applicant being an organization, the purpose of the grant must be of significant benefit to the district serviced by the Company.
- Projects must be capable of being completed or performed within one year of date of receipt of funding.
- Evidence must be provided of other funding secured or anticipated including cash, loans, anticipated income, & in-kind contributions.
- The maximum grant is generally \$3000.
- Details of grants will be publicly advertised in the Trust's Annual Report.
- Grants are unlikely to be allocated to organizations which have already incurred financial deficits or are budgeting a deficit budget for projects.
- Successful applicants that have failed to complete their accountability form within 12 months will be ineligible for further funding until outstanding forms are completed.
